
Your group will have a dedicated Youth Development Coordinator, which will be your contact at NAYC, they are responsible for providing advice and support to your group, and dealing with any requests for services.



Groups may request up to 3 free activity sessions and 3 free craft sessions per year, per affiliated group. Further sessions are available but will cost £15 to cover expenses and will be subject to availability. Please book early to avoid disappointment. There will be no charge for drop-in visits.

Groups may also access specialist training sessions, groups can request up to 3 free sessions per year, per group. Further sessions are available but will cost £45 and will be subject to availability. Please contact our trainer for details on available courses, session details and delegate capacity.

NEW GAMES

We are pleased to announce an update to the popular Games and Activities Pack. Since it was launched last year we have delivered hundreds of sessions to youth groups with many leaders utilising the ideas and hiring the equipment.

20 more games will be sent out to all affiliated groups in April. These are activities that do not require any additional equipment and so can be easily introduced to your group at no expenses. Full details of how to play the games will be included.

While our staff love being able to lead sessions we can't currently meet the demand and so this will enable you to run a fun session or maybe encourage some of the older young people to take the lead.

NEW TEAM MEMBER

In September Ky Hendrickson-Leith joined the team as the South Northants Activity Leader. He has an initial 12 month role working alongside Iain Anderson with a focus on delivering games and activities to groups in the area.

The role has been funded by South Northants District Council and will enable more groups to access delivery of our sessions. It will also enable us to conduct research into the youth provision in the area.

Ky is 21 years old and has a qualification in children's work. He is passionate about working with young people and being a positive role model. He hopes to be able to develop good relationships with the young people especially those from disadvantaged backgrounds and plans to pursue a career in youth work.

We are currently exploring ways to provide a similar service to the other areas of the County. We are grateful to South Northants District Council for their generosity and partnership in this project.



TRAINING

ACTIVE IN LEADERSHIP

This January we are launching a new training course for those who have already been through the Emerging Leaders programme. It is a residential weekend with spaces for 24 young people aged between 13 and 17.

The focus of the two days is empowerment. Empowering young people for volunteering in their own group, in community projects and in their daily lives. There will be a number of sessions engaging with relevant issues chosen by the group plus opportunities to design and lead sessions for each other.

Indoor and outdoor activities will include climbing, abseiling, zip wire, caving, 'Big Bounce' and the new Trek course.

The total cost including food, accommodation, activities and transport is just £45. All who take part are encouraged to raise this through fundraising and applying for funding from local councillors or trusts.

It was an excellent opportunity to appreciate all those who give of their time and energy week in week out to serve young people. Phil Houston was back at his old stamping ground and collected an award for his 26 years of service to youth work in Northamptonshire.



The full list of winners:

Young Leader of the Year

Winner - Libbie Taylor (Bugbrooke Youth Club) - Libbie is 15 years old and volunteers weekly as a young leader at BOTH Bugbrooke and Nether Heyford youth clubs. She has attended Emerging Leaders training, and is enthusiastic about helping other young people. She is a member of and plays an active part in the South Northants Youth Forum and has attended cyber safety & anti-bullying training, with the plan to help educate young people in other youth clubs. Libbie is in her 3rd year of helping at Bugbrooke youth club. She attends every week with a smile on her face, is full of great ideas to share with the young people and is always happy to lead an activity.

Commendation Certificate - Liam Gardner (Bugbrooke Youth Club) - Liam has helped at Bugbrooke for nearly 5 years. He is always keen to help and will apply himself to any task that is asked of him. He attends regularly and rarely misses youth club. The children respect Liam because of his commitment to the club and his positive fun attitude.

Gemma Crosbie (Full Gospel Youth Church) - Gemma has been working in the Xtreme Kids' Club for around two years and is always on hand to help out with anything that she is asked to do. She is also one of the Sunday School teachers and helps out with other youth projects such as The King's Army and will be helping with the Drop In Youth Club. Gemma is fun, lively and energetic and an example of a natural born youth worker, deserving of recognition for all her hard work.

Leader of the Year

Winner - Nicola Roberts (The Pavilion Youth Drop-in) - Nikki has run the Pavilion Youth Drop-in, in Higham Ferrers, for several years. Providing a vital provision, open all year round, for the local young people in a deprived area. This provision provides some stability in their sometimes chaotic lives, and a safe environment to be a young person. Nikki has a fantastic way with the young people, listening to their concerns and worries and providing positive solutions to support them through everyday life. Nikki is very active in the local community supporting other activities and events along with the young people and a team of dedicated volunteers.

Commendation Certificate - Margaret Tinston (Ecton Village Youth Club) - Margaret has been a dedicated leader of Ecton Village Youth Club for many years, with a skill for applying and raising funds to ensure the club always has sufficient leaders and a wide range

of activities available. Margaret encourages the young people to play an active part in the club and has supported many through the NAYC Emerging Leaders Programme. Margaret continues to offer positive activities for young people, leading residentials, entering competitions and accessing other opportunities when appropriate.

Volunteer of the Year

Winner - Dan Waterfield (Desborough Youth Centre) - Dan has been a young leader at the club for several years and is now an adult leader. He helps out at the club every week, supporting with any task and always with a smile. He uses his initiative in finding jobs to do, young people to support and always joins in and plays the games with the young people. The young people respect Dan and feel comfortable sharing and talking with him. He is a great role model for the young people and is really valued at the club.

Commendation Certificate - Helen Rees (Oakley Rangers) - Helen organises and chaperones the monthly litter picks for 'The Oakley rangers' in Corby. The scheme is available to young people to serve and support their local community and for their efforts they receive free music lessons and opportunities to participate in bands and performances. Helen coordinates the programme and goes out herself in all weathers, come rain or shine, ensuring that young people have access to some great opportunities.

Community Engagement

Richard Hawkes (Corby Junior Angling Club) - Richard has made a fantastic contribution to the local community of Corby. He runs a fishing group during the summer holidays giving lots of young people the opportunity to learn how to fish. This summer he has worked on a project with a local estate to enable young people to fish and have all the necessary equipment to continue fishing after the project had finished (this project was funded by the local estate). Richard has also started a new group for Home educated young people to learn how to fish and the environmental effects of fishing. They spend some time on the lake and the other time in the class room. Richard also supports an additional needs school to fish giving them the opportunity to be outside and learn new interests. Richard engages with various communities across Corby, providing positive activities for many young people.

Positive Participation

Winner - Jason Westbury (Potterspurty Youth Club) - Jason has been a staunch supporter of Potterspurty Youth Club since it started many moons ago. He arrives every week without fail to help with the heavy work of setting up whatever equipment or games are required or requested that evening. He then assists in creating a safe environment where the young members can enjoy themselves. Jason works tirelessly in helping with all the chores and activities that are organised for that evening. At any event outside of the youth club such as the school/village fete or fund raising event, the club can always rely on Jason being there to give a helping hand. Jason is a real star, and well deserves the Positive Participation Award.

Commendation certificate - Kelly Mercer (Harvesters & M.A.D.) - Kelly works in a very deprived area of Kettering where she runs a group with over 20 young people attending regularly. She supports the young people and their parents within the community running lots of events/ trips and going the extra mile for people. For example, unfortunately a mother of two children who attend the club passed away suddenly, the family were struggling with funeral costs, Kelly then organised several events to raise money for a head stone. So far they have raised over £500.

The community need people like Kelly, without her there would be nowhere for the young people to go and nowhere for the adults to get support. Kelly also works with young people to become leaders and supports adults to gain NVQ qualifications often having people on placements.

New Projects Pioneer

Winner - Barbara King (St Leonards Church, Yardley Gobion) for the Golden Ticket Scheme. - Barbara and the team at Yardley Gobion issued year 6 pupils with Golden Tickets, to attend an event at the church, with a view to starting a new group to enable young people moving to different Secondary Schools to maintain their friendships. Having given out 30 tickets, the event was attended by 26 young people, proving a real success and a new youth club had begun.

Commendation Certificate

Stacey Price (1st Oakley Vale Brownies/Guides) - Stacey has been a Brownie leader for a number of years. This last year she has set up a new Guide unit with the help of her leaders and is now looking at setting up a Rainbow unit. This means that on the Oakley Vale estate in Corby there are now places for young girls to go from the age of 6 to 14 years old and a chance for the older girls to become young leaders. This was desperately needed in the area due to no other facilities for the young girls. Stacey and her leaders take them away to take part in lots of activities and camps as well.

Outstanding Contribution to youth work

Winner - Beryl Goodall (Geddington Youth Club) - Beryl has run Geddington Youth club for OVER 40 Years each week all year round. She is very well respected and dedicated to supporting young people and the volunteers. Beryl and the volunteers also take the young people away every year on a canoeing and camping trip. She is also always striving to do new things with the young people and joining with other local Youth groups for activities for example they have just held a 5a side football competition with local youth groups. Everything she does is about the young people, we are recognising that commitment to young people and her dedication over so many years.

Commendation certificate -Richard Weekley & Phil Hearson (Rushden High Street Youth Club) - Richard and Phil have been working together for a number of years to continue to provide a great club for young people in their area. They have been there faithfully each week for many years and work together to provide the young people in the area with a great club. The club is one of our long-standing clubs, with an unbroken affiliation since the 1970's, with Richard's involvement throughout this period. Both a junior and senior group each week, a vital provision by the Church providing positive activities for all young people in the local community.

Distinguished Service Awards



Olly and Christine Lang (Deanshanger Youth Club) - Olly and Christine have been running Deanshanger Youth Club for over 5 years and are there every week to provide the young people in the area with a great place to meet. They have engaged with the Youth Activators in South Northants to arrange extra sports activities for the young people in the club and regularly provide craft activities through our own Countywide Craft Coordinator, Richard Houghton.

Jo Askew and Jane Wade (East Haddon Youth Club) - Jo and Jane run East Haddon Youth Club together, taking it in turns to run the group on alternate weeks with a team of volunteers they have managed to find. They always provide great activities for the young people and think up new games to keep them engaged. Apart from their dedication week by week they have also taken young people from the club on a weekend residential to Whitemoor Lakes and attended NAYC events such as the Night Walk.

Jack Jameson (Youth Inspired groups) - Jack has been attending the youth group since he was very young, joining in everything and eventually becoming a young leader. He has formed good relationships with the youth workers and has been very active in the youth forum. He is excellent with computers and takes charge when other leaders have difficulties. Over the years he has developed an understanding of the basics of youth work. Jack is hard working and is always committed and faithful to the youth club. He does a fantastic work with the older young people and

has a great relationship with them and encourages them during the session. He is willing to lead and support sessions at the youth club and brings enjoyment to the young people. Jack is a valuable member of the team at the youth clubs. He is an enthusiastic and motivated young man who consistently puts in 100% to ensure that the young people have a positive experience when they are at club. He often comes early to help and always stays until everything has been tidied away. He is great with the young people and has built particularly positive relationships with the older young people. Jack helps to make Wootton Youth Club a great place for the young people to be and is really good to work alongside!

Anne Lindsay (Ryehill Youth Club) - Anne set up the Ryehill youth Club in May 2015 now has a thriving group of young people. She faithfully gives up her time each week to run the group and provides a wide range of activities for the young people to enjoy and also organises events and fun days for the community.

Phil Houston (NAYC) - Phil worked for NAYC for 26 years as a volunteer and paid member of staff. His contribution to youth work in Northamptonshire cannot be underestimated as he has sought to provide knowledge and assistance to the NAYC team and group leaders.

NEWS FROM AROUND THE COUNTY

NORTHAMPTON CHRISTMAS PARTIES

A number of Christmas parties took place in groups across the town. At Daisy Chain Father Christmas and the elves turned up to give out gifts of toys donated by Disney. The young people and their families also enjoyed a disco, party games and lots of party snacks.

ROLLER DISCO

Groups from Northampton enjoyed a night of Christmas skating at Benham Sports Centre in December. Over 100 young people turned up and had a great time skating to a pumping soundtrack. The night was such a success that two more are in the pipeline for later this year.

CORBY, EAST NORTHANTS, KETTERING & WELLINGBOROUGH

HARVESTERS

Harvesters youth group have been supporting a member of their group after her mum sadly died. They have also been undertaking fundraising events to help buy a headstone. The group and community raised over £500 in memory of the mother.

GADS YOUTH

This group put on their first major performance. After forming two years ago with only eight young people they now have an attendance of over 20 and impressed all who attended.

ASPERGERS & ADHD TRAINING

Nick Cox ran a training session for those working with young people with Aspergers and ADHD. It was a well-attended event that gave a comprehensive overview of the needs and practical tips that are involved to provide support to young people on the autistic spectrum. The event took place in East Northants but requests have already been received for this to be held in other locations. Watch this space.

DAVENTRY AND SOUTH NORTHANTS

YOUTH FORUMS

A new Youth Forum has started in Daventry. The group will be developing community projects and will be consulted on the needs of young people in their area. In South Northants the Youth Forum will be rolling out a Cybersafety Awareness course. The course has been put together by the young people themselves and they will be delivering it to their peers.

NEW STAFF

Ky Hendrickson-Leith joined us in September. He is delivering activity sessions to groups in South Northants and has done so extensively over the last few months. The response has been overwhelmingly positive with many groups booking him to return. Ky is also helping to mentor older young people in Towcester and compiling a database of youth provision in the South Northants area.

CHURCH GROUPS ALTERNATIVE HALLOWEEN

James Yates has been inundated with requested from churches for support in starting new groups and delivering Christian based activities. He has also managed to find time to support some big events in the last couple of months. Alternative Halloween events took place at Pytchley and Broughton churches. There were over 50 young people at each one with pumpkin carving competitions and a light party.

LAUNCHPAD

Six different youth groups from South Northants came together for a Launchpad event. This involved the young people taking part in activities and planning a future youth worship event.

GOLDEN TICKETS

A new initiative set up by the Church of England called Golden Ticket has led to a number of new youth groups being set up. Children transitioning from primary to secondary school are given a golden ticket inviting them to an event which forms the core of a new group. This has led to a number of successful nights and helps the young people to continue friendships and move smoothly from one school to another.

CRAFTS

COLLAGE COMPETITION

This year's collage competition had a Paddington theme – the bear not the train station. Many entries were received showing incredible creativity and imagination. The winners were: *Ellie and Magda from Ryehill Youth Club.*



TRAINING

EMERGING LEADERS

Two Emerging Leaders weekends took place in October and November. Twenty four young people took advantage of the opportunity to spend two nights away at our Centres taking part in activities. A number of the young people who attended are now actively involved in leading their groups and were recipients of awards at our Annual Awards Dinner.

VENTURE ACADEMY

A residential weekend was organised for Venture Academy. The group was on their second year and learned to develop skills in leadership, volunteering and mentoring. The student feedback included comments which confirmed the group had grown in confidence, made new friends and overcome their fears.

GET RESI-READY

Youth leaders were encouraged to take their young people away for a residential in September when they took part in a taster weekend. Get resi-ready allowed the leaders to stay at one of our activity centres, take part in activities and see for themselves the benefits available for their group. As a result a number of groups have now

FUNDING

Have you applied for an empowerment fund from your local councillor? If not, why not?

Each councillor has a pot of money to distribute at their discretion to worthy causes – up to £3000. If it isn't used it is sent back to central government. The funds must be applied for in writing and have a specific purpose. You will also be required to report back on how it was spent. Some photos and a small write up should suffice, or invite them to come and see for themselves.

So whether it is for new equipment, a trip out, a community project, a residential, or any other need you have search online for your local representative and send them an email asking for their support. I'm sure they will be only too happy to help a good cause.

The following is from the Northampton Borough Council website but other Borough's and Districts have a similar scheme:

WHAT IS THE SCHEME FOR?

The Councillor Community Fund (also known as Councillor Empowerment Fund) is a scheme which grants £3,000 per year, to each of Northampton Borough Council's Councillors.

The fund exists to enable Councillors to efficiently and effectively allocate money within their ward, to make a positive impact on the areas they represent and to empower local residents to be active in their communities.

Examples of Organisations that might be funded. This list is not exhaustive; it is intended to give an idea of the wide range of organisations that could receive funding:

- Organisations that are working with Schools, Uniformed Groups, such as Scouts, Children Centres and Youth Clubs
- Sports Organisations and Clubs
- Parish Councils
- Organisations working with Older People
- Organisations working with People with Disabilities
- Community Centres/Facilities
- Cultural Organisations
- Women's Groups
- Environmental Groups

Some of our groups have already benefitted including amongst others:

St James, Spencer and Dallington received £400 to deliver 25 workshops.

5th Northampton Girl's Brigade received £500 for a trip to London

Reelscape received £200 to make a film.

Northampton Youngers received £250 to run healthy eating sessions.

Market Street Youth Club received £200 towards a youth worker

Goldings Youth Project received £300 towards the cost of a coach.

Rye Hill youth club received £400 towards equipment costs.

Camp Hill youth club received £500 towards DJ equipment.



Ask Uncle Rich

Dear Uncle Rich

Our group has gone through a transition recently with a number of core members moving on and some new ones joining. As a result there isn't the same atmosphere as there was when everyone knew each other and mixed together. Can you suggest

some activities that may help to give a sense of unity and build relationships within the group?

Dear Sue

Thank you for your letter. It is good to hear that you have new members coming along. These transitional times are common in our line of work and do take careful managing. From my experience one of the most helpful tools in the youth work toolbox is a residential experience.

I have been on many of these myself as a volunteer and a leader and have witnessed first-hand the difference that it makes, not just in the group dynamic, but in the individual lives of the young people who attend.

Taking them out of their familiar environment, giving them team tasks, all pitching in to help and having new experiences are all great ways to forge strong bonds and provide positive learning experiences and memories.

We have two centres that specialise in these youth group residentials and offer discounted rates for our affiliated groups. You can book a weekend stay all-inclusive with activities and food for just £62 per young person. We will even help with transport as we have a minibus for hire subject to availability.

There are of course other centres that provide similar opportunities for you and your group. In the meantime you may wish to speak with Jacqui our Trainer about a fun session incorporating useful themes around team work and communications or contact your local Area Coordinator to arrange an activity session.


I hope that is helpful for you and any other groups in a similar situation. Keep up the good work.

All you need to do is contact the centre you wish to visit and inform them that you're an NAYC affiliate member by providing your affiliate number. The package is available from September-March each year.

The £59pp/£62pp is for a Friday-Sunday stay and includes 4 activities, accommodation and meals from Friday evening to Sunday lunchtime. The price increase applies from January 1st 2017.
